

5 Steps To Obtaining Your Montana Journeyman Electrician's License

Step 1. Sign up for the exam.

Application: To do electrical work in Montana, you must have a license. To apply for a license, contact:

You will have to pass an exam to get a master, journeyman, or residential electrician's license. The exam is given by Experior. Practice exams are available for \$25. For information on the exam, contact:

Qualifications: To apply for a journeyman electrician's license you must prove you can meet either of these two requirements:

- Completion of an apprenticeship program of four years (8,000 hours) electrical work;
- Four years (8,000 hours) of practical work experience with wiring, apparatus, or equipment for electrical light, heat and power. No more than 4,000 hours can be in residential construction. Remaining hours must be in commercial, industrial, or institutional construction. The Board may give you credit for hours you spend in a recognized electrical trade school.

Exam/license fees: There is a \$75 fee to take the exam, and a license application fee of \$120.00 (includes initial license fee).

Step 2. Purchase the required books for your exam.

<http://www.constructionbook.com/contractor-license/montana/index.asp>. You must purchase these documents and books in preparation for the exam and, if applicable, bring them with you on testing day for the open book portions of the exam.

Step 3. Start studying!

To fully prepare for your exam it is best to thoroughly study the required documents and books, as well as any recommended studying materials. The amount of preparation time needed will be different for each individual. Be sure to allow yourself enough time to fully prepare for the exam.

Step 4. Follow the rules.

Your first responsibility as an examinee is to arrive at the exam site on the proper date, at least 30 minutes prior the exam's scheduled start time, and with your exam confirmation number and proper photo identification (issued by a state or federal regulatory agency).

NO personal items will be permitted in the testing center. Examinees will not be allowed to bring or use reference books other than those indicated on the examination outline. Along with the approved reference books, candidates must also bring a watch without an alarm, and a non-programmable, battery-operated calculator.

Step 5. Good luck on the exam!

The Journeyman Electrician's exam has at least 60 questions and covers the following subjects:

Subject

Grounding and bonding

Services, feeders, and branch circuits

Raceways and enclosures

Conductors

Motors and controls

Utilization and general use equipment

General knowledge of the electrical trade and calculations

Low voltage circuits including alarms and communications
